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On February 26, our monthly program will feature well-known woodturner Larry Walrath who will demonstrate how to use the McNaughton Center Saver tool to core bowls from half logs.

Being able to cut multiple bowls from a single wood blank offers several benefits including lower cost per bowl when using expensive purchased wood and is an environmentally sound approach to woodturning.

Professional woodturner and instructor Larry Walrath has cored hundreds of bowls using the McNaughton Center Saver. His program will demonstrate the steps in properly using the center saver.



Whether you already own a McNaughton Center Saver system and want to improve your skills or if you are thinking of giving bowl coring a try, come enjoy the program and watch the wet chips fly.

Larry Walrath is a Renaissance man who not only is an accomplished woodturner, but also an engineer, singer, trumpeter, photographer, husband, and father. He comes from a family of wood artists; his father and grandfather both made



furniture and turned wood. His ancestors include wood artists from the Black Forest region of Alsace-Lorraine who emigrated to America in 1712.

Larry has been turning wood since a child. He is a

member of the American Association of Woodturners, Central Texas Woodturners and Brazos Valley Woodturners. Larry teaches wood turning at his studio in Round Rock, Texas. His work is displayed in local shops and galleries.

Dear WNT members,

I got to see a whole bunch of different tools/systems and then I got to do a hands-on try-out! Well, this month's club meeting falls right in line with this subject. We are looking forward to Larry Walrath's demo on coring out bowls from half logs using the McNaughton Bowl Coring system. Sweet. Now instead of sweeping away all those shavings

Larry Roberts received fifty hardwood saplings, two feet tall, to give away courtesy of Vickie Abrams at International Forest Company in Moultrie, Georgia. ies. His work can be seen on his web site at <http://www.larrywalrath.com>.

When Larry picks out a piece of wood from his collection of rescued timber, he examines the bark and see if there are any interesting shapes that might be revealed. He then

cuts a "cookie" off the end of the log to learn more about what is inside. He then reduces the piece to a size that will fit on the lathe, letting the grain direction, color and texture determines what the piece will become. His work draws from the work of masters in wood and pottery over the centuries and he enjoys working with clients to produce a piece that reflects their desires and budget.

“Turning Hollow Forms”

The WNT January 2009 program was presented by professional woodturner Steve Worcester who is a member of the Dallas Area Woodturners and the AAW online forum administrator. Steve’s program described how he turns a small hollow form with a glass lid to produce a vessel that combined woodturning and glass hobbies. He generally uses automotive lacquer to finish his vessels.



Not the same old grind -- Steve makes a relief grind on the bottom of the gouge to enable him to



work in tight quarters. Looks like it has more facets than the Hope Diamond.



The shavings fly as Steve shaped the exterior of the hollow form.

In order to hollow efficiently, it is necessary to frequently clear the chips especially on a vessel with a very small opening such as this. Once the vessel has been shaped, including the hole size, a mold is made for the matching glass top. The glass is then fired in a kiln to conform to the curvature of the top of the hollow form.



After the exterior is finished, the hollowing process begins. After the initial hollowing, Steve used a captive bar hollowing rig to complete the hollowing process.

The final step is to reverse mount the hollow form to turn away the bottom portion.

Steve Worcester presented an outstanding program that was very interesting and informative.



Alan Lacer: WNT Featured Instructor for 2008



Alan Lacer, our Spring Demonstrator/Hands On Instructor for 2009 was voted the best teacher

of the ten most popular woodturning instructors in the United States in a recent poll on one of the popular forums. He will present an all-day demonstration on Saturday, April 25 from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM at R. D. Evans Community Center, 3242 Lackland Road, Fort Worth, TX 76116. Hands on classes, limited to six students per class, will be conducted from April 26 through 30 at Jimmie Gill's shop at 3425 Meadow Oaks Dr. in Haltom City. There will be three one-day classes on Sunday, Wednesday and Thursday and one two-day class on Monday and Tuesday.

Alan Lacer has been involved in woodturning for over thirty years as a turner, teacher, writer, exhibition coordinator, demonstrator and past president of the American Association of Woodturners. His work has appeared in a number of regional and national exhibitions. Alan has been a regular instructor and demonstrator of the craft—having worked in all fifty states as well as several foreign countries. His writings have covered technical aspects of woodturning, many specific projects, stories related to both contemporary and historical woodturning and the long turning traditions of Japan and Germany. He has also produced three videos on his own, with two of them winning a total of four national awards. In 1999 the American Association of Woodturners awarded him their Lifetime Honorary Member Award for his contributions to the field.

The following is the curriculum that Alan has suggested.

April 25, all day demonstration:

- Skew Chisel: A tool with an attitude (shaping, sharpening and honing, at least 6 different cuts)
- End-grain hollowing: different methods, concentrating on hook tools, examples of a variety of boxes and end-grain turned bowls

- Making a hook tool and awls
- Turning an end-grain lidded box

April 26, hands-on session:

Skew Chisel Lab -- Getting it shaped and sharpened, then on to exercises with specific cuts, putting it all together for several small projects.

April 27 and 28, hands-on session:

Woodturning Fundamentals -- In this course we will start with sharpening of the tools, exercises, then move on to projects that first involve spindle work, then a face-grain bowl.

April 29, hands-on session:

The turned lidded box -- In this session will look at different types of lidded boxes, concentrating on the end-grain variety. Material covered will be turning a basic box, book-matched inlay, hand-chased threads (although we won't be making a box with hand-chased threads, students will have a chance to try such threading on practice pieces) and locking type lids.

April 30, hands-on session:

Option 1: leave open to see if the other 1 day sessions have more demand than space.

Option 2: A day of bowl turning: mounting methods, preparing stock, bowl gouge grinds (advantages and disadvantages and preferred applications of each grind), open bowls, natural edge bowl, shear scraping techniques, reverse chucking methods, discussion of finishing

Sign-up sheets will be available at the club meeting. The cost is \$10 for the all-day demonstration and \$90 per day for the hands-on classes for WNT club members. Registration for the classes will be limited to WNT members only through March 26. After that date, registration will be open to the general public. The registration fee should be given to Treasurer, James Haynes at the time of signing up for the class. each student was able to experience the joy and pride of making a useful item on the lathe that they could take home and display for the whole family to admire.



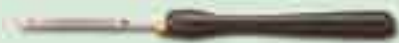
