

That is ... until I was viewing turnings at the SWAT 2007 Instant Gallery and saw some pieces that had been pierced. Many were impressively well done and a few not so well done, but it was the inspiration that I needed to try my hand at piercing. Initially, I used my Dremel tool with some success, but then searched the Internet for additional available information about piercing. I found that there were some very expensive tools available in the form of high speed dental hand pieces as well as some straight craft hand pieces -- all in the "above four hundred dollar" price range. Being the frugal engineer and consummate experimenter (also known as, "cheap" to non-engineers), I built a system from surplus parts for about a hundred dollars. I use this system to produce pierced areas on my turnings, some of which I have brought to the club meetings.



When John Horn asked me to do a demonstration on piercing, my initial thought was that watching someone do piercing for an hour might be a bit like watching paint dry or grass grow. So with that in mind, I thought it would be much more beneficial to demonstrate how to construct a piercing tool setup using low cost components and describe how each works within the system. I will then turn a thin wall bowl and demonstrate some basic piercing techniques.
