Who and what is Trinity River Woodturners Council?

Trinity River Woodturners Council (TRWC) is a new organization that started in the fall of 2018. It started as an idea from two local woodturners, Tod Raines from the Dallas Area Woodturners (DAW) and Ron Howe from Woodturners of North Texas (WNTX). Both Ron and Tod had attended Ron Campbell's Hands-On-Retreat in Michigan in July of 2018. They experienced the retreat from different points of view - Tod as an instructor and Ron as a participant. Both met a lot of new friends, learned a lot and had a wonderful time. From this experience and their desire to share this experience with their local clubs, Tod and Ron kicked off the formation of TRWC and the idea of the local woodturning retreat.

Today the TRWC is an approved chapter of the AAW. Our by-laws require board members from each of the five area clubs - Dallas Area Woodturners (DAW), East Texas Woodturners (ETW), Golden Triangle Woodturners (GTW), Hunt County Woodturners (HCW), and Woodturners of North Texas (WNTX). The mission of TRWC is "to provide education, information and hands on training to those who are interested in woodturning". To accomplish this mission the TRWC brings together the five area clubs to share knowledge, experiences, demonstrators, training opportunities and other woodturning related events. However, the main vision that originated with Ron Howe and Tod Raines was to successfully create and operate a hands-on woodturning retreat.

As the name implies the “TRWC Hands-On Woodturning Retreat” is meant to be a relaxing, enjoyable time for woodturners to come together and learn and share ideas through direct practical experience.

The event will involve the following:

- up to 40 lathes from mini to full size
- four students/lathes per class
- 10 classes of four students each turning at one time
- four 2 hours sessions a day
- two full days of turning (a total of eight sessions)
- up to 40 individual classes per day
- about 25 local instructors, known for their unique project and teaching
- over 26 unique on lathe classes with a large variety of project-based instruction
- many off lathe activities (some tied to a turned project) including
 - o pyrography (wood burning)
 - o power carving and piercing
 - o airbrushing
 - o finishing
 - o pen segmenting
 - o bandsaw segmenting and re-assembly
 - o photography
 - o rose engine lathe demonstration
- tools and supply vendors
- lunch both days is included

The TRWC Hands-On Woodturning Retreat will be held on Oct. 18th & 19th, 2019. The location is at the North Lake College West Campus, 1401 Royal Lane West, DFW Airport, TX 75261. The registration for attending this event will open in late July. The setup for the event will take place on Thursday Oct 17th from 12 noon to 5pm. The tear down and cleanup will happen on Sunday Oct 20th.

To make this event happen successfully, we will need volunteers, helpers and some equipment.

- Lathes - if you have a mini, midi or other portable lathe please consider lending it for the weekend
- Tooling - to create a tool loan program we will need extra turning tools, chuck, drive centers, Jacobs chuck, grinders and grinding jigs
- Equipment - if you have wood burners (pyrography), power carvers, airbrushes that you could loan for the weekend it would be very helpful
- Volunteers - of course none of this happens without volunteers. We will need help with the following.
 - o Help to setup lathes stations, off-lathe class areas, vendor booths, etc
 - o Help to setup and serve lunch (we have a lunch plan and committee leader in place)
 - o Help to create and put up some signage
 - o Help manning the registration table, tool loan program and event coordination

Librarian's Suggested/Favorite Reads and DVD's

You CANNOT believe everything you see on the Internet, but can you believe most of it ... if it pertains to woodturning or woodworking.

I would love to tell you "YES", however; I would still give you a big cautionary, well ... maybe. The Internet is fascinating, and I have watched so many videos which have aided me in my learning to turn specific objects as well as how specific turners - from around the world - turn many of their signature pieces. I have ALSO seen some people who still think that you can do dangerous things and you will have no problems just because "they" didn't have any. Then you see the video from the person who is heading off in an ambulance at the end of a video after proclaiming from the first, *"This might be dangerous, but it works for me so it should work for you."*

Obviously, these are **NOT** the people I am suggesting you watch and pattern your work after, unless you have a latent death wish. On the other hand, many of the other turners who practice safe turning are out there and very much worth your time. These are also many of the same people we have show up for demos at our meetings, and for other club's meetings, too. We have already had a couple of "remote" demos for some very well-known and famous turners AND we should be in the process of getting some others. New wave of teaching, maybe, but still rather new, of course.

EMPTY BOWLS

Empty Bowls is an annual one-day fund raising event for the Tarrant Area Food Bank. The Food Bank provides food to sister agencies in 13 surrounding counties. The sister agencies then provide the food to needy children and families. Patrons at the Empty Bowls event pay \$65 or more and get to choose a bowl (wood, ceramic or glass) to take home and sample food from numerous booths of local restaurants. There are also numerous corporate sponsors that provide a sizeable portion of the total donations.

The May 1st 2019 event had gross income \$301 thousand which was 20% more than the previous year.

The next Empty Bowls event will be Tuesday, March 17, 2020.

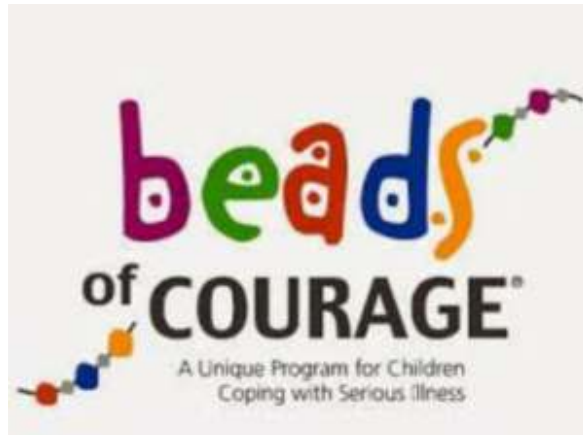
We are off to a slow start with two months gone and only one bowl donated.

Beads of Courage Program

This program is designed to support, strengthen and encourage children and families coping with serious illness. The program lets the children tell their story using colorful beads as meaningful symbols that commemorates milestones they have achieved along their treatment path. The average child gets 500 beads. The Woodturners of North Texas is taking on the challenge again this year.

Requirements

The lidded box/bowl interior diameter should be 6" (5" minimum diameter, 6" depth, 4" minimum). The lid should have a finial/knob that is easy for a child to grasp and not too elaborate. The 'Beads of Courage' logo bead to be placed inside or outside will be available at the meeting or can be mailed to you upon request. The "Beads of Courage" inscription can also be engraved or burned in the lid and can be placed inside or outside of the lid (no political or religious undertones are accepted). Customarily your box or bowl will be taken to SWAT and displayed along with the others from the club. Your thanks is knowing a very ill child is getting something that will help them through difficult times.
