Making Good Shavings

he Tarrant Area Food Bank will hold their annual Empty Bowls fund-raiser event on Friday, February 24th, 2006 at the Bass Hall and Maddox/Muse Complex in downtown Fort Worth. Empty Bowls is a benefit luncheon in which attendees are served soup, bread and desserts donated by local restaurants and food merchants. There is a ticket charge of \$25 for lunch that includes one bowl for each attendee. The bowls are donated by area artists and are displayed on tables in the hall where attendees may review them and choose one to take home. The Empty Bowls web site is www.emptybowls.org.

There will also be a "bump table" where attendees can choose a better quality bowl for an additional fee (\$20 last year). A silent auction is also held where attendees may bid on gallery works.

WNT members have donated 60-70 bowls for the past

several years and we have learned that wood bowls are very popular. About 1500 bowls are donated each year and most



of these are pottery and ceramic. This year we hope to substantially increase our donation of bowls. We are not going to have a chapter wide toy project this year so we can focus on making bowls. We do not intend to set a target number but we should be able to donate several hundred bowls.

With the coming of fall, it is time to get back in the shop. As you work on your projects, take time to make some bowls for this worthy cause.

Part 3: A simple lathe speed strobe

Although knowing the exact speed of your lathe is hardly ever essential, it may sometimes be a useful thing to know. This article describes a simple way to measure your lathe RPM at several fixed points. This may be most useful on a lathe with a mechanical variable speed drive such as the Delta 1440 or Jet 1442 because the owner's manuals usually do not provide information on the speed detent settings of the control lever between the minimum and maximum speeds.


The tool used to perform this measurement is called a stroboscope. It consists of a rotating disk with rows of alternating black and white bars and a light source that flashes at a known frequency. I designed this particular stroboscope specifically to measure speeds between 450 and 2400 RPM since that is approximately the speed range of my Delta 1440 lathe. It is simply a six-inch diameter paper disc with rings of white and black bars that is pasted or taped to the front of a six-inch faceplate. The measurements that I made on my lathe showed that the speed to be slower than stated in the manual and the speed change between stops on the control lever were not equal increments.

In addition to the strobe disc and faceplate, you will need a cheap fluorescent light that has a magnetic ballast. A lot of the newer high-efficiency instant-start fluorescent lamps use electronic ballasts and they will not work with this strobe disc because the strobe function depends upon the 120 flashes per second that lamps with magnetic ballasts provide. Electronic ballasts operate at much higher frequencies and lamps that use them usually output 10,000 or more flashes per second. It can also be helpful to have a watch that has a stopwatch function to allow estimation of speeds other than

the exact points where the bars of black and white remain motionless.

The strobe disc may be downloaded from the WNT web site at www.woodturnersofnorthtexas.org/tutorial/strobe.pdf and then printed so that it can be cut out and pasted to a faceplate. When ready to make speed measurements, it is best to turn off all incandescent lights and also any fluorescent lights that use electronic ballasts. Each ring of the strobe corresponds to a particular speed. Starting with the outer ring and going towards the center of the strobe disc, the speeds in RPM are: 450, 600, 514, 720, 800, 900, 1200, 1440, 1800, and 2400. The bars will also appear stationary at twice the RPM of each of the values listed here.

The best way to make speed measurements is to begin at the slowest lathe speed and increase it slowly until you see one of the outer rings appear to stop rotating. The RPM rating for that particular ring will tell you the speed of the lathe at that point. If the detent position of the control handle doesn't exactly correspond with a speed where a ring appears stationary, you can estimate the speed by measuring the number of complete revolutions that a bar makes in one minute. If the bars in a ring appear to be slowly rotating clockwise, subtract the number of revolutions in one minute from the listed RPM for that ring to get the actual RPM. Conversely, if the bars in a ring appear to be rotating counterclockwise, add the number of revolutions to the listed RPM for that ring to get the actual RPM. However, this will only work if the rings are not rotating too fast to keep track of the bars.
