I'm sure it affects all of you the same, but don't forget that there is a Challenge issued to each one of us. Bring one bowl a month to the meeting for the 2007 Empty Bowls project. This is truly a great way to show off your skills – or for those of us who tend to focus in other specialty areas of woodturning – a chance to develop a new set of skills. The added bonus is that it is a very nice way to help our fellow man who is less fortunate or has made some questionable decisions – which we all might think: "There, but for the grace of God, go I."

So let's see a large quantity of bowls at this month's meeting. There is NO SHORTAGE of wood! All the Mesquite you could ever want is available to the entire membership – FREE! A bowl does not have to be out of an expensive chunk of "Unobtainium" at megadollars per square inch. Turn it green and let it warp, use "Found" wood or laminate a

They root themselves in the earth and send their branches to the skies. They stand in the harshest of weather wholly unprotected except for such protection as they bring themselves. Strength and endurance and character hold their limbs outstretched and send their roots deep into the earth in the most unlikely of places. They absorb and grow and absorb and grow. Absent the trees we would not be having this meeting so I just wanted to give them their due before moving on.

Let us unleash our creativity.

Now that the trees have provided the possibilities to us how do we get started creating our pieces? We need to find what it is that informs our head and heart and hands. I find it helpful to have an external collection of shapes, forms and images to draw upon. A personal dictionary of pictures informed by your soul. This vocabulary will allow you to know yourself well enough to stand before the lathe and make your cuts with a vision rather than a hope.

core a bundle of creative longing to come out.



You will find the shapes, colors, and textures that call to you. You can see what people, places and objects move you. This process will give you access to creating woodturnings that reflect your soul.

The WNT Empty Bowl Challenge

Last month our president, Stormy Boudreaux, laid down the bowl gouge before us (since he didn't have a gauntlet to throw down) and, by so doing, issued forth a challenge to all members of the club including the spindle turners, pen turners, box turners, hollow form turners, peppermill turners, Santa turners, and skew thread chasers: every member has been challenged to turn at least one bowl per month this year and January of next year to donate to the Empty Bowls Project in February, 2007.

Randy Johnson has bravely accepted the challenge by seizing the gouge and taking on the task of being the official "Head Honcho" of this challenge. A realistic goal of 500 bowls total which is an average of 60 bowls per month for the remainder of the challenge. In May, 15 bowls were donated. If you have not yet joined the challenge, now is the time.

As, our President, Stormy Boudreaux, said in his column this month, we have all the mesquite that we can use -- and it is FREE! If we don't use it, the bugs will! Don't let some ugly bug take your wood.
