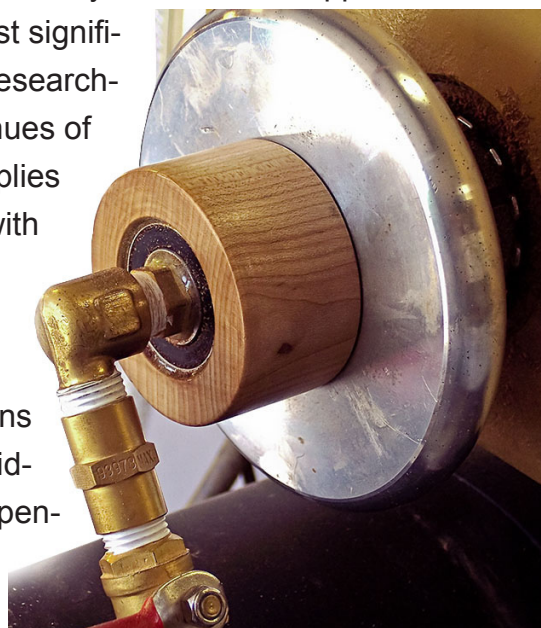
Our demonstration will show how to put a

New WNT Library Video Addition

“Making a Peppermill” by Ted Sokolowski

I have come to the conclusion that most woodturners learn the basics of turning quickly (within about a year). So rather than focusing attention on subjects (e.g. sharpening or “how to cut” etc.) that have been thoroughly covered by other great DVD’s and books, I have focused my instruction on the finer elements of design and the tool control necessary to achieve the subtleties of design. I hope, through my observations, to help you better “see” what makes up good form and elegant lines so that you can apply that to your own work and grow from there. The “platform” I’m using for this instruction is the simple peppermill because it affords many graceful lines that can be studied. But even if you never make a peppermill, what you will learn from this DVD will help increase your knowledge of tool control so that you can apply graceful contours to all of your work and it will help you understand the thought processes necessary to capture the finer aspects of design. Apply these techniques and your work will ultimately improve.

This DVD is very long -- 1 hour and 50 minutes. The first time I watched it I fell asleep. But do not take that as a negative, I was tired. So after my nap and able to devote the proper attention to the DVD, I found this to be a very informative video. Yes it is long but it is an excellent video to explore design elements of the peppermill and it is told from an artist perspective. While there is nothing wrong with an artist perspective, I do view a peppermill as a functional item to use and, therefore, more in the crafts area than in the arts arena.

But putting the art versus craft discussion aside, it is a great teaching video with ten chapters of in depth peppermill making information.

Chapter 2 – Design Your Peppermill

Chapter 3 – Find Visual Interest

Chapter 4 – Prepare the Blank

Chapter 5 – Bore the Cavities

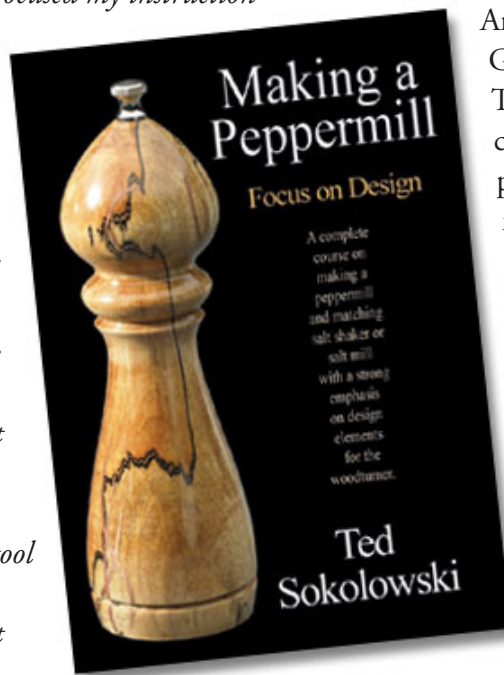
Chapter 6 – Make a Jam Chuck

Chapter 7 – Shape Your Peppermill

Chapter 8 – Sand and Finish

Chapter 9 – Assemble the Peppermill

Chapter 10 – Make a Matching Salt Shaker



Another nice feature of the DVD is Ted’s Goody Box, in Ted’s own words; Ted’s Goody Box includes supportive clips that re-affirm the techniques and procedures throughout the video in a more detailed closer look that would otherwise break the flow of the main DVD. I’ve included these clips in the menu under the title of Goody Box. You can view these after watching the video to help you better understand the concepts of design in a more concrete way. Clips include: The Bandsaw Jig, Making an Alternate Salt Mill instead of a salt shaker, The Underhand Grip, The Rule of Thirds and Parallelism.

I found this video to be an intermediate to advanced interest to the turner. Many of the techniques require experienced tool technique usage. The skew work presented is excellent but not for a beginner. Can a beginner benefit from this video? You bet! But, I would not recommend a peppermill as a beginning project until the beginner has mastered tool control. After saying that and reading my own words, it is time for this turner to go practice making wood chips.

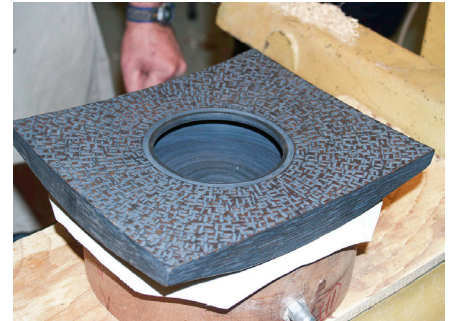
"Turning and Decorating a Platter" by Al Stirt



Renowned wood artist Al Stirt of Enosburg Falls, Vermont began the demonstration by turning a wide rimmed platter from maple. --->



After the rim has been completed, he paints it black. The decorative pattern will be carved through the painted surface. --->



Here he shows an example of a wide rimmed vessel. He uses a home made vacuum vice to hold it in place while it is being turned.



A power chisel type of carving tool is then used to cut the pattern after drawing a pattern on the rim. --->



The lines grow into a scheme for repeating the basic shapes. --->



The overall scheme for developing a rather free form design can be seen here.

The well attended program by Al Stirt proved to live up to its billing as a very educational and entertaining demonstration.

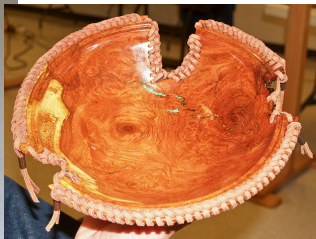
“BOWL EDGE TREATMENT USING LEATHER AND STRAW”

Fred brought several examples to show the various ways that he has used lacing to enhance the edges of his vessels.

AAW Membership Benefit:

Educational Opportunity Grant (EOG)

One of the benefits of AAW membership is the Educational Opportunity Grant program that provides money for worthwhile causes that benefit woodturning. Here is Matt Rabe's story on the grant that he received.

Woodturner of North Texas member, Matt Rabe, has developed and submitted to the American Association of Woodturning (AAW) a grant idea to demonstrate woodturning to public schools in the HEB School District. The AAW award Matt his grant stipend last month.

If WNT readers remember, at last November's club meeting Dr. Genender addressed the club on the merits of joining AAW and one of those merits was the grant program the national AAW has set up to award AAW members to further the art and passion of woodturning. Well, Matt took the initiative; he joined AAW; and then he set out to develop his grant idea and submit his proposal to AAW. For all his determination and hard work, Matt was awarded an \$800 grant from the AAW. His idea is to bring a lathe back into the school to demonstrate turning. Matt states, "Most schools don't have shop class anymore, so I thought this would be an

interesting way to do it. My approach was to get the funding to purchase a small mini lathe, chuck and stand. I do already own a lathe, but it is too large and fragile to bring into the school." Matt is currently working with the art teachers at LD Bell, Central Junior High, and Stonegate Elementary, since these are schools that his daughters go to, or will go to.

Matt's thoughts were, "The whole purpose of the grant is "expand and share wood turning." If we didn't have Dr. Genender come in and talk to us about the grant program I won't have even known about it." He adds, "The application process is pretty straight forward. Four easy questions. You can overwhelm them with info, but I kept it somewhat simple. I e-mailed the art teachers prior to sending in the application with my idea and also sent my web site to them so they could see what I do.

Their return e-mails acknowledged the interest of me coming in and demonstrating wood turning. I also provided the AAW a detailed list of what I was going to purchase... lathe, safety equipment, chuck, and also some tools."

"After I sent in the grant application - January 15 was the deadline - I didn't think I would have a

chance. I just joined the club, and I have been turning for less then 2 years. I also thought maybe I would need to have a lesson plan, and everything planned out, to even think about being considered." As is turns out the AAW is going to award almost \$80,000 this year. Approximately 150 people apply each year; the odds of a positive award are very good.

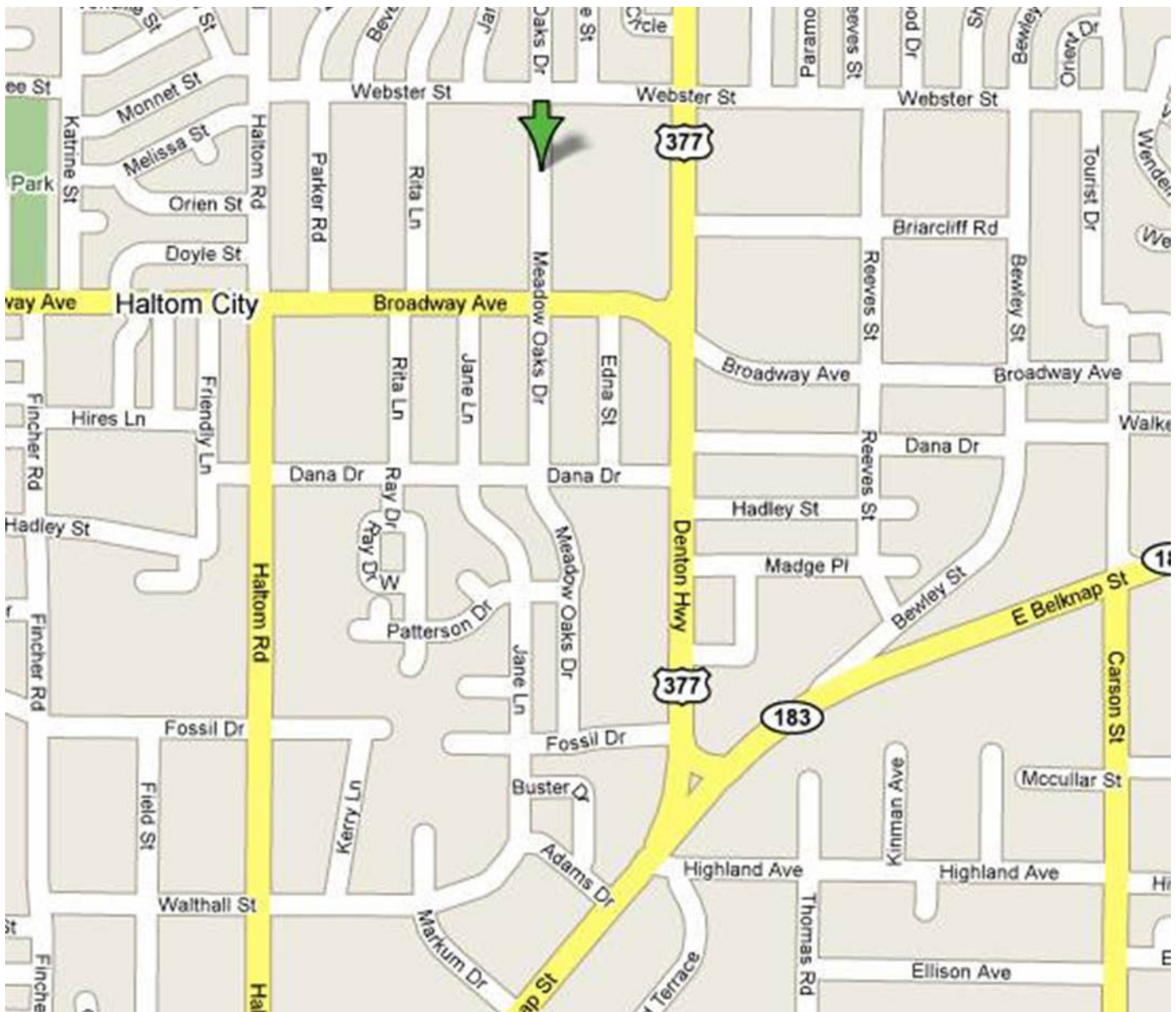
The club will supply the hamburgers, hotdog,
